DNR Fisheries Update from Tony Kennedy & Edie Evarts

What a difference a year makes! A year ago we had just wrapped up a slow winter fishing season, that saw a shifting ice sheet, deep snow, and poor catch rates. This past winter, while we still had a shifting ice sheet, we had almost no snow on the ice and unbelievable fishing – particularly in February. Winter harvest was a record-high 166,000 pounds! I'd speculate this was due to being some of the only drivable ice in the state and a strong late-season bite. Even with access restricted to walking and shuttles for much of December, there was more fishing pressure that month than the entire summer of 2023! Fishing pressure in February was double the average for that month and harvest was triple the average! This made for some very memorable fishing.

In early March, as we do each year, we met with the Red Lake Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC). This group is made up of individuals that represent a variety of interests connected to Upper Red Lake – including the Upper Red Lake Area Association. During our meetings, we review the status of the walleye population and discuss regulation options for the upcoming summer and winter seasons.

As I wrote in the fall newsletter, spawning stock biomass (SSB) is currently in the optimal condition, which gave us a target harvest range of 120,000 to 240,000 pounds for Dec 1, 2023 through November 30, 2024. With winter harvest coming in at 166,000 lbs, we have a little less harvest opportunity for the upcoming summer that we wished – darn you February! Although we can exceed the top of the target range (240,000 pounds) in a given year, we would have to go to catch-and-release only for the remainder of the harvest year if walleye harvest reached the 288,000-pound cap. This made the decision about summer regulations a little trickier than usual. Ultimately, it was decided that the safest option was to start with a **three fish bag limit with one fish allowed over 17 inches from Fishing Opener through June 14 and a four fish limit with the same size restriction beginning June 15th. Being more restrictive during the early season when fishing pressure and catch rates are highest and relaxing to the four fish bag limit all but eliminates the risk of reaching the harvest cap.**

The walleye population is in great shape and full of young fish, some of which will be reaching sexual maturity by next year. I expect that spawning stock biomass measured in our gill nets this fall will increase such that we will be in the "surplus" condition for the 2025 harvest year that starts on Dec 1st which will give us more harvest opportunity at that time (target harvest for the surplus condition is 240,000 to 336,000 pounds). At this point we are anticipating a four fish bag limit with one fish allowed over 17 inches for the winter season, but winter regulations will not be finalized until after our fall netting results are available in October and meeting with the CAC.

If history means anything, catch rates this spring following an earlier-than-usual ice out may be a bit slower than some of our recent late-ice-out years, but hopefully the sheer numbers of fish out there will still result in a strong bite and lots of happy anglers. I certainly plan to be among them!

Notice from the Upper Red Lake Area Association April 15, 2024

With no new relevant information regarding HF4780 and SF5080, The URLAA has <u>decided to postpone</u> the Town Hall Meeting scheduled for <u>Saturday</u>, April 20th, 2024.

The decision to originally host a town hall meeting was made to provide new information to residents regarding HF4780 and SF5080. Due to the number of phone calls, letters, and e-mails letting legislators know our concerns and opposition, our voices are being heard clearly at the legislature.

At this point hosting a town hall meeting will not bring forth any new information to the public. When/if new information becomes available it will be posted on the URLAA website. If a town hall meeting is needed we will revisit the event.

The URLAA has retained a lobbying firm to track bills and provide updated information to us. We are prepared to continue to oppose the legislation if it moves forward this session.

Rest assured we are not stopping this fight against restricting access to public lands. The URLAA will continue to work with our elected officials, lawyers, and local organizations to prevent this from happening.

Help prevent aquatic invasive species on Upper Red Lake

We encourage property owners and visitors to Upper Red Lake to learn how zebra mussels, stary stonewort, spiny waterflea, and other aquatic invasive species are transported from one body of water to another. Here is how you can help prevent AIS on Upper Red Lake.



1. CLEAN all visible aquatic plants, zebra mussels, and other prohibited invasive species from watercraft, trailers, and water-related equipment before leaving any water access or shoreland.



2. DRAIN water-related equipment (boat ballast tanks, motor, portable bait containers,) *and* drain bilge, livewell and baitwell by removing drain plugs before leaving a water access or shoreline property. **Keep drain plugs out** and water-draining devices open while transporting watercraft.



3. DISPOSE of unwanted bait, including minnows, leeches, and worms, in the trash. It is illegal to release bait into a waterbody or release aquatic animals from one waterbody to another. If you want to keep your bait, you must refill the bait container with bottled or tap water.

KNOW THE LAW: You may NOT...

- Transport watercraft without removing the drain plug.
- Arrive at lake access with drain plug in place.
- Transport aquatic plants, zebra mussels, or other prohibited species on any roadway.
- Launch a watercraft with prohibited species attached.
- Transport water from Minnesota lakes or rivers.
- Release bait into the water.

Boat cleaning stations in the area are here to help boaters prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species.

Each station includes tools to help you clean off your boats, including a vacuum and air hose.

The stations are also equipped with lights so late-night anglers can clean off their boats with ease.

Please do your part to help stop the spread!



ATV and OHV Trails

This area has several public lands that allow for off highway riding. Get out this summer and explore the area on your ATV or OHV. Do a little hunting, berry picking or just explore the great outdoors. Respect is the key to keeping your privilege to ride on public land. Follow these guidelines for a safe and enjoyable ride.

- Stay on established trails
- ♦ Minimize erosion—avoid excessive wheelspin in sensitive areas
- Remove your trash and liter
- ♦ Be courteous to all trail users—slow down or stop when meeting others
- Keep your machine quiet—noise is the biggest irritant
- ♦ Be kind to animals—don't harass or chase them
- ♦ Ride within your limits—safety and under control
- ♦ Wear proper protective gear—helmet, boots, gloves etc.
- Alcohol and riding do not mix—riding after consuming alcohol is illegal and dangerous
- Obey all posted closed and no trespassing signs
- Know your riding area and its property boundaries

Big Bog State Recreation Area Web Cam

The Webcam at Big Bog State Park gives you a live view of Upper Red Lake from the top of the 100 foot high fire tower located in the south unit of the Big Bog State Recreation Area in Waskish. Red Lake is the largest freshwater lake fully contained within the boundaries of a single state in the entire United Sates, and is known for its Red Lake walleye and trophy Northern pike.

Waskish was one of the first district ranger locations developed in the 1920s. This site was chosen because of its accessibility to a state highway, its elevated land and its unrestricted view in all directions.

Built in 1937, this fire tower was originally located at the Pine Island forestry station in Koochiching County, and was built to be identical to a previous tower located on the same site.

Many things have changed over the last 100 years, but not the view from the top of the tower! It still offers an unrestricted, amazing view of Upper Red Lake and a portion of the 500 square mile Big Bog.

Just go to the web and search for Big Bog Web Cam to look at the live view of the lake anytime of day.

What's Cooking — Cheese Dip

16 oz. cream cheese

13/4 c. shredded cheddar cheese

1 oz. pkg. dry ranch dressing mix (or a little less)

3 T. sour cream

2 to 3 T. onion, chopped

5 pieces bacon, cooked crisp and crumbled

Combine all ingredients into a bowl. Stir until of the ingredients are fully incorporated.

Chill at least 4 hours, or overnight.

If you want to make it into a cheese ball, place a piece of plastic wrap into a bowl. Transfer the mixture into the wrap in the bowl, using the wrap to help form mixture into a ball.
